

SURVEY 2019

What follows are the questions used in our 2019 survey of non-binary students and staff in UK higher education. The survey was open for six weeks in April and May of 2019 and received 367 responses.

We are making the survey available under a creative commons license (see below) in order that it can be used and adapted by others doing research in this area. We also want to ensure our research is both transparent and helpful to communities beyond academia.

The survey is reproduced here in its entirety, however, please note the following:

- Question 2 (p5): This question is missing an option to select the North West.
- Question 5 (p6): We asked the question 'how were you assigned at birth' after debating whether or not this was necessary and whether it would yield any generative data. We knew at the time that this was a complex question and so explained that we included it because we wanted to explore whether non-binary experiences of HE differ depending on how participants were assigned at birth. However, given the increasing hostility towards transfeminine people and gender non-conforming people more generally, and the ways in which in other contexts questions like this are used as proxy for essentialist questions about biological 'sex', we will not be asking this question again.
- Question 11 (p8): This question (are you answering this survey as...) is a multiple choice question that only allows one answer - participants could choose from:
 - Student (present or past)
 - University staff member who teaches
 - PhD student who teaches

Depending on respondents' answer to this question, the survey branches in three directions with questions that are relevant to each sub-group of respondents. The branches come back together from Question 67 (p35) to the end of the survey.

Non-Binary Genders in Higher Education: Lived Experiences, Imagined Futures

About the project

This survey is being undertaken as part of a wider research study into non-binary genders in Higher Education (HE). We are using a number of different methods to gather information on the lived experiences of non-binary staff and students in HE institutions and to create spaces for non-binary people involved in HE to come together and dream a different future.

The overall aims of the study are:

- To understand non-binary student and teaching staff experiences of HE, including navigating institutions, engaging with specialist resources, reflecting on the curriculum.
- To use our data to provide universities with policy recommendations and examples of best practice.
- To gather resources and share experiences with other members of the non-binary academic community to create a different HE experience for students and each other.
- To add to the literature on inclusive curricula and explore the disruptive potential of non-binary genders for transforming the academy.

You are specifically being asked to participate in an online survey which asks you about your experiences in HE, whether as a student, a member of staff with teaching responsibilities, or a combination of both.

Who are the researchers?

We are three non-binary/genderqueer academics working in HE institutions in London who feel that our experiences and needs as non-binary teachers or students have never

been captured by research. For us, then, devising and carrying out this research is an attempt to bring our politics and activism into HE. We recognise our privileged positions as white, non-disabled, securely employed academics and are committed to the dismantling of the racist, classist and ableist structures of academia.

Jennifer Fraser is University Director of Student Partnership and Principal Lecturer in Social Sciences at the University of Westminster. Jennifer works on critical higher education studies and gender studies.

Raf Benato is Senior Lecturer (Education Development) in the School of Health Sciences at City, University of London. Raf works on public health, educational theory and teaches healthcare students about LGBTQ inclusive care.

Francis Ray White is Senior Lecturer in Sociology at the University of Westminster. Francis Ray works on trans, fat and queer embodiment and teaches extensively about gender and sexuality.

What do we mean by 'non-binary'?

We recognise that 'non-binary' is a contested and shifting term; in this project we are using it as an umbrella term to denote a range of gender identities which fall outside the male/female binary and may or may not involve identifying as trans.

We welcome your participation in this survey if you do not identify wholly as one or other of the binary genders. This could include (but is not limited to) the following: genderqueer, genderfluid, agender, bi-gender, pangender, androgynous, androgyne, or neutrois.

Who is eligible to take the survey?

Anyone who identifies as non-binary as explained above and fulfills one of the following criteria:

- is a current student (undergraduate, postgraduate or PhD) at a UK HE institution;
- has graduated from a UK HE institution in the last 5 years;
- works in UK HE in any teaching and learning capacity (including librarians, learning developers and others);
- is a PhD student who teaches at a UK HE institution.

What does participating entail?

Participating in this survey will involve answering questions about your experiences and how you have navigated HE as a non-binary student and/or member of staff. There are some questions about you, your role(s) and your institution. We will also ask about your

institution's existing trans and non-binary policies and about how able you are to be open about your gender identity with others in your institution.

The survey should take you around 20-30 minutes to complete. If you choose not to answer any of the open questions, the survey will take about 10 minutes.

What are the risks and benefits of taking part?

There should be no risks to you of taking part in this project. No individuals should be identifiable from the survey data, or any publications, reports or outputs arising from it. You won't be asked to identify which HE institution you study/studied/work at. You will also not be obliged to recount any difficult or painful experiences unless you choose to, and all of the questions are designed to be optional. If the survey does raise issues you feel you need to discuss further, please see the sources of external support at the bottom of this page.

There are considerable benefits to participating in this survey. You will be contributing to the generation of new knowledge about non-binary people and HE. Your input will help to us to produce a best practice toolkit and policy recommendations for HE institutions, as well as informing the development of inclusive practice in curriculum design and delivery.

What will happen to my data?

Responses to this online survey are confidential and will not be shared beyond the project team. Data will be stored in encrypted and password protected files, complying with the requirements of the Data Protection Act 2018 and GDPR.

The information you provide in the survey will be analysed by the researchers and may be published in reports, academic publications, toolkits or best practice guidance or presented at academic conferences. Direct quotes from the survey may be (anonymously) used in any outputs.
