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Unpacking the curriculum at Westminster: A decolonial enquiry

About the project

This survey is part of the Pedagogies for Social Justice (PSJ) project, based at the University of Westminster. We are carrying out this research to explore the aspirations and dreams of students and staff around decolonising the curriculum. For us, engaging with education in ways that help to liberate ourselves and others, demands a rethinking of the ideas and structures sustained by culture, media, policy, social environments and education itself. As bell hooks (1994) reminds us, education is a practice of freedom. Therefore, our classrooms and educational spaces should be hubs for infinite possibilities and dreams. Your participation in this survey will help us understand where change is needed and how you see meaningful change taking place.

Our overall aims are:

- To gain insight into student and staff perceptions about the process of decolonising the curriculum.
- To identify individuals or groups who might be key agents for driving change within the university, as well as to pinpoint areas where opportunities for change may be present.
- To explore student and staff dreams and aspirations for decolonial initiatives within the university community.

Who are the researchers?

We are a collective of five student and academic researchers, who are members of the Pedagogies for Social Justice Project. The PSJ project is a multidisciplinary initiative aimed at advancing educational practices that promote equity, inclusivity, and social justice within higher education. Our diverse team brings together expertise from various academic backgrounds, united by a shared commitment to fostering positive change through collaborative research, advocacy, and community engagement. What do we mean by 'decolonising the curriculum'?

We understand decolonising the curriculum as any efforts directed at challenging and reshaping the colonial and Euro/Western-centric biases in our educational systems. It involves acknowledging, critiquing and dismantling forms of coloniality embedded in the content and delivery of the curriculum,

as well as the power dynamics that influence our teaching and learning environments.

Who is eligible to take the survey?

Any current student or staff of the University of Westminster

What does participating entail?

Participating involves providing some information about yourself, such as, your level and area of study, student/staff status, ethnic identity, gender and age. We will then ask a series of questions about your perceptions of coloniality and decolonisation efforts within the university, including your aspirations and dreams.

The survey should take you about 10-15 minutes to complete. If you choose not to answer any of the open questions, the survey will take about 5 minutes.

What are the benefits and risks of taking part?

There are considerable benefits to participating. You will be contributing to ongoing conversation and action surrounding decolonisation efforts within our university, ensuring that your voice is heard in shaping the future of our educational community. Your insights and feedback will help identify areas for improvement and guide initiatives aimed at creating a more inclusive and equitable curriculum. There should be no risks to you in taking part in this project. No individuals should be identifiable from the survey data, or any publications, reports or outputs arising from it. You will also not be obliged to recount any difficult or painful experiences unless you choose to, and all of the questions are designed to be optional. Responses to this online survey are confidential and will not be shared beyond the project team. Data will be stored in encrypted and password protected files, complying with the requirements of the Data Protection Act 2018 and GDPR. The information you provide in the survey will be analysed by the researchers and may be published in reports, academic publications, toolkits or best practice guidance or presented at academic conferences. Direct quotes from the survey may be (anonymously) used in any outputs.
